




## "TIMELESS" HOMAGE TO VERMEER

"My new painting, "Timeless", pays tribute to Johannes Vermeer's beloved "Girl With a Pearl Earring," but it also employs some mysterious references to time that are meant to make us take a second look. Where is this room we're looking into? And when are we looking; now, or then? The girl's familiar face, the Delft vase and the tulips all remind us of the seventeenth century, and of Holland in its Golden Age. The Georgian mantel clock brings us a little closer to the present, yet the narrative is still steeped in the past. And the girl still looks as if she's about to speak, as she always has. But, wait... Did she just hear something? That cell phone next to the clock rang, maybe with her personal ring tone. Was she expecting a call from the twenty first century? Is it you on the line?"



# "RECORDING THE WEST" HOMAGE TO REMINGTON

"This painting entitled, "Recording the West" is a small tribute to the work of Frederic Remington, especially to the images he made early in his career, as a journalistic illustrator working to record the West that had already nearly vanished. He loved and celebrated those last fleeting days when the West was still wild, and was instrumental in shaping its romantic image in the American psyche. "A Dash for Timber" is one of the first of his so-called "easel paintings," works that lifted him out of the illustrator category and into the "famous artist" realm. Here we see an example that bridges those two worlds. The very American red apple, the cactus and the 20th century toy cowboys remind us of the glorious legend, while the cityfied photograph of the artist suggests his role as historian."
